Historic Washington School Bell & Cornerstone Restored By Autumn Pino & Jeff Bohr

As background, the bell and cornerstone from the original Washington School building had been built into a masonry structure at the NW corner of the high school building. When construction started on the new auditorium and other renovations, that bell structure had to be dismantled. The bell and cornerstone were saved. Fast forward to 2023 when discussions were underway to add a weight room and CTE (Career Technical Education courses – today's updated version of 'shop' classes) to the existing facilities. LAA Committee members Troy Caspers and Jeff Bohr had been invited to participate in the CTE planning. During a meeting in 2023, a School Board member present at that meeting gave an update on the Facilities Committee plans. Troy and Jeff questioned where the original bell and cornerstone were being stored, as well as what the School Board's intent was to incorporate those items into the renovation plans for the Andreas Centre lobby. Troy and Jeff passionately told the history of the items, and the fact that the Lisbon Alumni Association strongly wanted to see those items incorporated into the renovated lobby to honor the school's traditions and history. Superintendent Autumn Pino asked Emergent Architecture, the firm hired to design the additions and renovations, to create a rendering to incorporate the historic bell and cornerstone into the renovated lobby area. As the design planning continued, the historic items were incorporated into the final designs. As shown in the photos on Page 3, you can see the final product, which was very tastefully accomplished! Also, as part of the lobby renovations, the Wall of Donors from the Million Dollar Challenge had to be removed. While they attempted to save the individual bricks, that proved impossible. However, the School added a new Wall of Donors into the redesigned lobby (see photo). Superintendent Pino indicated that she personally made sure the donor names were reproduced in the same order and positioning as the original brick wall. It remains a very impressive memorial! Note that the School District continues to digitize many of the historic items from the original lobby, including all of the High School class composite photos. Once that project is completed, anyone will be able to access the digital files via a link that will be shared. Once LAA has that link, we will be posting it on our FB website. Lisbon H.S. Girls Wrestling By Brandon Horman

The IGHSAU debuted wrestling as its 11th sanctioned sport for girls for the 2022/2023. At that time, Lisbon initiated its Junior High Girls Wrestling program, but did not start a high school level team. Over the years we have had a great relationship with Mt. Vernon regarding cooperative sparts sharing agreements, and we figured with girl's wrestling being something new, we would look to provide the opportunity to our girls through that avenue for the 2022/2023 and 2023/2024 seasons.

With a growing Junior High program and interest from several high school students, it was decided in the spring of 2024 that we would form our own H.S. Girl's wrestling team. At this time, Seth Hall and Cassie Bowdre were hired as Co-Head Coaches. Cassie had previously served as our Junior High Girl's wrestling coach, while Seth had played an influential role as a volunteer within the Lisbon Boy's program, including serving as a key component of the Lisbon Mat Pack program.

During the 2024/25 wrestling season, a lot of firsts occurred with the Girl's H.S. wrestling program. We had 11 girls out for the first season of varsity wrestling. We hosted our first home dual meet; had our first conference champions crowned; had our first district champion crowned; had two state qualifiers and the program's first state place winner! Overall, it was a very successful inaugural season for the Lisbon H.S. Varsity Girl's Wrestling program! The future looks bright!!




Lisbon Community School is undergoing an exciting expansion, providing opportunities related to Career Tech Education (“CTE”) and learning, athletics, and overall school improvement.

Project scope of work encompasses a three-phase approach:

- Phase One, includes boiler removal, utility work, interior demolition, and prep work for the addition. Phase One work was completed during the 2023/2024 school year.
- Phases Two and Three, includes the following additions: Career and Technical Education (CTE) space located at the NE corner of the H.S. building; weight room addition along the south outside wall of the Lion’s Den; and additional classroom space as part of the CTE Addition. Additionally, the Lion’s Den Lobby will be completely reworked along with the Legacy Hallway. On August 27, 2024, the Weight Room addition and Foyer/Lobby remodel were substantially completed. This portion of the project includes the following key improvements:
 - A dedicated space for weight and strength training.
 - A new illuminated *Signature Lisbon Lion* exterior sign.
 - Upgraded air conditioning for the Lion’s Den.
 - A remodeled Foyer, designed to create an open and improved circulation space.
 - A new concession area with displays that highlight Lion’s Den activities.
 - A dedication plaque to honor the donors of the Andreas Addition.
 - A historical school bell display.
 - An interactive display monitor, which can be customized to feature alumni achievements, school activities, and academic successes. This display offers future flexibility to showcase ongoing school accomplishments.
 - Additionally, the 1939 High School gym received new lighting, and the damaged wood floor was repaired, restoring its full functionality as both a gym and recreational space.
 - The CTE addition was substantially completed on December 6, 2024. This new CTE shop space spans nearly 2,855 square feet and is equipped for both wood and metalworking activities, with a dedicated paint finish room featuring independent ventilation. The CTE addition also includes:
 - Four new classrooms.
 - A collaborative open space with future expansion capabilities.
 - A secure storm shelter rated to withstand 250 mph winds, designed with a precast structure and specialized coiling shutters to protect against projectiles.
 - At present, punch list items are being addressed, and we are preparing for the upcoming refresh of the Legacy Hallway. Below are pictures of the new spaces.



As a 1980 graduate of Lisbon High School, I never dreamed that I would be able to contribute to the Lisbon School in the way I did 45 years later. Growing up in Lisbon my father owned a railing fabrication company called Ironcrafters. I was able to work with my father and learn the railing trade. During my high school years, I was able to take all the industrial art classes offered by the high school at that time. The industrial arts teacher was Mr. Paul Harrington, and the classroom was under the bleachers of the old gym. Mr. Harrington was one of the hardest graders in the high school but made learning fun at the same time. I learned a lot of valuable skills from both my father and Mr. Harrington that eventually brought me to where I'm at in my job career.

Presently I own a structural steel fabrication company called All State Steel that specializes in railings. In 2022 when the school was designing the new CTE and weight room I was asked to be on a committee with other members of the community to help with the planning of the new additions. In 2023 I was awarded the structural steel and miscellaneous metals package for the new additions. Now that the new additions are completed, it makes me proud to know that my grandkids will be able to enjoy and learn from the opportunities offered by the Lisbon School that I had 45 years ago and that I was a part of it. A Bit of Lisbon & School History Through the Years

The first pioneers to settle in the Lisbon area were Charles Haskins & wife in 1838. They had migrated from western New York down the Ohio river to St Louis, up the Mississippi to the Cedar River, then landing near the Ivanhoe area. They settled east of the current town about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile in an area they named Yankee Grove. Soon thereafter others from the east started settling nearby. Simon Archer, James Kelsey, & William Young to name a few. The community got a big boost in 1847 when a large group from Lancaster County, PA came to settle here. Christian Hershey, a preacher for the United Brethren Church, his children & grandchildren settled around the current town as almost 60 people made the trek. In 1849-50 Hershey built the first United Brethren Church building, which still stands today, just south of Hills Bank. In 1850 Daniel Runkle, John Neidig, Frederick Blessing, Geo Rupert & their families also arrived from Pennsylvania and settled in the community. In 1851 The first streets were laid out by Michael Hoover, John Kurtz & John Eby. The community was also named Lisbon, as there were towns named the same in New York, Ohio & Pennsylvania.

The first schoolhouse in Lisbon was a log building erected around 1842 about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile west of the current center of the community. With the growth in the fledgling town, by the 1850's the schoolhouse was not large enough for the growing number of students. In 1855 a brick schoolhouse was erected on property owned by Michael Hoover on South Penn St. It too was soon filled to over capacity with more than 100 students. In 1862 a two-story wood frame schoolhouse was erected just northeast of the current school system location. It served the community until 1889 when the large brick "Washington" building was erected & dedicated.

In 1860 the railroad came to the area, thus providing a much easier way for settlers & commerce to reach the young community. Larger businesses started appearing, more streets were laid out. The town began to change from a small religious community to a center of businesses & new industry. In the 1870's the current downtown area began to develop. This led to locals eventually establishing the incorporated municipality of Lisbon on February 10th 1875. The first town council was elected and had their 1st meeting on March 2nd. Lisbon continued to grow rapidly through the end of the century with the buildup of the current downtown. Businesses included a shoe store, blacksmith shop, hotel, bank, multiple grocery-general stores, barber shops and even a small factory producing farm equipment.

By the turn of the century (1900) Lisbon had a telephone system, electricity with their own power plant and a municipal water system with a "standpipe" located just north of downtown. In 1908 a tornado severely damaged the power plant & farm buildings at the Jacob Meyers farmstead nearby. In 1914 an electric interurban railway was established between Lisbon & Cedar Rapids by the CRANDIC railway. With it, people could now be in Cedar Rapids in an hour or so without having to take the main railway. It ceased operation in 1928 as the automobile was rapidly becoming the mainstay of personal transportation.

By the mid-teens the Lincoln Highway (30) was quickly becoming the first transcontinental highway, which was the Mainstreet in Lisbon. The mud & gravel roads that originally made it up were being paved, making it much easier & faster to use. With this, locals began seeking employment in the many factories in the Cedar Rapids community. Even so, Lisbon was still a bustling community providing services to all those who lived in and around the community. Lisbon schools started to offer sports for high schoolers around the turn of the 20th century. Unfortunately for basketball, there was no place to practice. The students used the Opera House downtown for practice and games for basketball beginning in 1917. As the community grew the need for more school facilities were evident. In 1939 a new building was constructed that housed a gymnasium, office space and more classrooms. In 1941 enrollment was 250 in grade school & 80 in high school.

Highway 30 in the early 1950's was rerouted from being the east-west main street in town to passing through the southern end of the community. This marked the beginning of a change for the merchants in the downtown, with some relocating to be by the new highway. Lisbon was evolving to become a bedroom community with increasing numbers of residents finding employment in the larger cities.

Also, after WW II the community grew rapidly & the need to expand the school system again soon faced the community & schoolboard. In 1952 many (not all) surrounding country schools closed and the elementary students were redirected to Lisbon Community. The high school students had been coming to town for school for many years already. In 1956 a new elementary building was added to manage the growth. In 1962 the school districts area was remapped and Lisbon gained students that use to attend Martelle schools, which closed after 1961. Once again, the school system needed more space, so in 1962-63 a new building dedicated for high school was built by Kruse Construction, a local contractor.

In 1966 the last country school, "Coon Creek", closed & its students were bussed to town. In 1969 Lisbon Schools restarted its football program, which had been dropped many years before. Starting first with Jr high, then high school. Lisbon played their "home" games on the Mt. Vernon school field until a new field was built in 1972 thanks to a generous donation from former Alumni Delmar Walmer for which the field was named in honor of.

Lisbon Schools won its first state sports title in wrestling in 1973. Its dominance in wrestling continued for many years thereafter. The Washington school was in need of many repairs along with the need for more classrooms. The Washington school building was razed and a new building erected in its place the summer of 1975 through 1976. A much-needed larger gymnasium was also included in the project.

1975 was the Centennial year of the city's incorporation. A large week-long celebration was held in conjunction with the annual "Lisbon Pork Barbeque Days" the last week in August. It included a historical play of the city's history, antique car parade, sauerkraut making demonstrations, & square dancing just to name a few events.

The Lisbon Pork days event was dropped after the Centennial year, not sure of the reason, but in 1982 the celebration was renewed again by the efforts of Beryl O'Connor, LaVonne Bova & Gary Port. It was renamed "Lisbon Sauerkraut Days," which was the event's original name. The event has occurred every year since then.

In the 1990's The Andreas foundation, whose family are Lisbon Alumni & were executives for the industry giant ADM Corp, offered a 1-million-dollar match to the school system to fund another building addition. The community pulled together to generate \$700,000 of the match. The Andreas's were so impressed by the community's effort, that they contributed the remaining \$300,000 in addition to the 1 million dollars. Thus, the new addition along with the LECC preschool facility were implemented & constructed. Also, in the 1990's the local economy improved & along with lower interest rates helped new subdivisions to appear with new homes. A small number of companies started up operation on the outskirts of town.

As Lisbon moved into the 21st Century our community continued to grow. A historical center was established downtown & many of the residents volunteered to collect information & historical items about local families, our school systems, & community events. The History Center continues to be the mainstay for the archives of our community. At the school system, a new building & gymnasium was constructed for the LECC center. A few years later a new auditorium was constructed for the vocal & musical arts programs. Most recently, a new weight room & more classroom space have been added to the school system campus.

In 2017 the Iowa Dept of Transportation began the Highway 30 bypass project around Lisbon & Mt Vernon. The project moved Highway 30 completely south of both communities with a length of about 6-7 miles. The project was completed in 2019 and opened to the public. At first many locals were concerned for the impact of businesses with the change, but as time has shown the businesses continue to thrive.

With the upcoming sesquicentennial celebration this summer it will be a time all residents can come together and celebrate the past, present, & future of this great community. As a lifelong resident, I am proud to be a member of this community & will continue to "give back" to it!

LHS ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Given to alumni for specific and meritorious service to any not-for-profit organization or military service. Service must be for a non-compensated capacity for non-profit organization nominees or a full-time past or present member of the U.S. Military.

LHS COMMUNITY IMPACT AWARD
Given to alumni who should be recognized for their service contributions to the Lisbon community in any capacity and service for any reason.

LHS FINE ARTS AWARD
Given to alumni with exceptional accomplishments in the fine arts while attending LHS. Conference honors, Superior ratings, All-State recognition(s), major roles in theatre productions, concerts, etc.

LHS ATHLETICS AWARD
